"Recovered Territories": The Use of History in the Creation of the New Polish Borderland after the Second World War

In the post-doctoral project "Recovered Territories" I analyse theprocesses of reconceptualising the Polish relation to the new northwesternborder after the Second World War through a study of therelation to the littoral regions (the so-called Greater Pomerania) and theaccess to the sea, as well as the use of history in these processes. Theaccent is first of all on the processes of incorporating the new borderlandinto the historical narrative of the Polish state and attempts to eradicatethe memory of the old, prewar Polish-German border. The new border, although imposed, was thus to become regarded as a 'natural' one. The topic is studied in four main aspects: the official use of history, thescholars' use of history, the relationship between the scholarly and official discourses, and the lasting effects on the contemporary Polish relation to the north-western borderland, as expressed in political and scholar evocations of history. The method of research is conceptual history, allowing to identify the keyconcepts in the political and historical discourse, and analyse thenarratives behind those concepts, as well as the ways in which the different narratives fought for the dominant place in the discourse.
